This Week's Readings: God's purposes embrace the whole world and peoples of every race and culture. We meet in his name to celebrate his unchanging love for all.

1st Reading *Isaiah* **60:1-6** - The prophet Isaiah shares a glorious vision of God's light drawing people of all nations to worship and praise God together.

2nd Reading *Ephesians* **3:2-3, 5-6 -** St. Paul explains that through Christ a new truth has dawned that God's purposes are not exclusive to one race but embrace all peoples and nations.

Gospel: *Matthew 2:1-12 -* The familiar account of the wise men from a foreign country visiting the infant Jesus reminds us of God's concern and welcome for all humankind.

Message from Fr. Peter: So we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany, when Three Wise Men visited the baby Jesus in the manger with their gifts. At least that's the image on our Christmas Cards and crib, and that's what tradition tells us. But this does raise a few questions. Firstly, the Bible doesn't mention the number of men visiting Jesus, only that there were three gifts. The suggestion that they were 'wise' comes from the fact we are told that they have studied the stars, and the suggestion that they were kings or men of wealth and power comes from the expensive gifts they present to the infant King. The Greek word used for these men is of course 'Maji' which is a term used for Persian priests, probably Zoroastrians, a religion which has many parallels with Jewish and subsequently Christian theology. The suggestions that they were foreign, gentile, wealthy Kings, makes them neatly the opposite of the local, Jewish, poor Shepherds; Jesus was born for everyone, creed, colour, whatever. When did they actually visit Jesus is a question I was asked in the car on the way to see 'Hamilton' last week? Well, Herod heard of the birth of Jesus from the visit of the wise men, and then set about killing first born males of two years or younger. This suggests that Jesus might have been two years old or thereabouts when the Wise Men visited - if they had visited Herod and Jesus much nearer his birth, then Herod need not have called for the slaughter of children up to two years. This also suggests that the Wise Men visited Jesus in the Holy Family's home in Nazareth, to which St. Matthew tells us they returned to after they had fled to Egypt, although as St. Luke implies that the Holy Family went straight to Nazareth directly after the Presentation, on the eighth day, they may have been visited earlier, as no indication is given as to how long it was that Herod realised the Wise Men weren't returning and set about the Slaughter of The Innocents. And what happened to the Wise Men's gifts? The importance of the gifts is their symbolism: gold representing Jesus' Kingship, frankincense His Divinity, and Myrrh foretelling of his death. But after their mention in the scriptures, we hear nothing more. Some traditions say the gold was stolen by the thieves who were crucified with Jesus, or that Mary Magdalene carried the oil to the tomb on Easter Sunday. Confused with all of this? I am! Lots of questions, conundrums which no doubt theologians have tied themselves in knots over the years. However one thing is clear; we are told that when the wise men saw Jesus, 'they prostrated themselves and did him homage'. That is without question. So perhaps the teaching is for each of us, wise or foolish, rich or poor, now, whenever and forever, to do the very same thing. Incidentally, did you hear about the three wise men in the House of Commons? They were lost. I'll get my winter coat... (the new one I got in the sale at River Island).

Continued Christmas Thanks: Over the festive season we celebrated four beautiful masses together, and huge thanks to everyone who made them so special. And huge thanks from me personally to: Michael and David, my friends and deacons; our Altar Serving teams and those who work in our Sacristies; the amazing Organists, Musicians and Choirs (I tell everyone how blessed I am with the music in my parishes); The Readers; Ministers (both inside and outside Church); Welcomers; Collectors; Counters; The Flower People and everyone who decorated our Churches, the Bell Ringers (apparently I am the only Catholic Parish Priest in England with two working towers!); everyone who works in the house and the grounds; Eileen in the Office; Those who look after the buildings (a 'Forth Bridge' job); the refreshments people (on Sundays and First Fridays); and those who Fr. Peter gets to whip up refreshments at various points (usually at the last minute - you know who you are); St. Peter's SVP and St. Joseph's Care and all those who help with outreach to those in need not least who bring along food and those who distribute it for us; our social event and fund raiser organizers; all those who work with the children - the Catechists, Children's Liturgists, the Teachers, everyone at St. Peter's School,

the Parents, and all the children; anyone who should be on this list but isn't (forgive me!); and everyone who comes along to our Parishes and makes them living signs of the Body of Christ in the world today. May the coming year bring us many blessings. Blessings and thanks to you all.
